#### PAST PERFECT SIMPLE VS. PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS

PAST PERFECT SIMPLE (HAD + PAST PARTICIPLE)	
<p>The <b>past perfect</b> refers to an action that was completed prior to another action that took place in the <u>past</u>.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• He <b>had learned</b> Spanish before he <u>went</u> to Spain.</li> <li>• President Lincoln <b>had attended</b> the theatre before <u>his assassination in 1865</u>.</li> <li>• They <b>had had</b> lunch when I <u>arrived</u>.</li> <li>• She <u>passed</u> the exam because she <b>had worked</b> very hard.</li> </ul>
PAST PERFECT CONTINUOUS (HAD BEEN + VERB-ING)	
<p>We use the <b>past perfect continuous</b> to show that something started in the past and continued up until <u>another action stopped it</u>.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• We <b>had been playing</b> soccer when <u>the accident occurred</u>.</li> </ul>
<p>We use the <b>past perfect continuous</b> to show that something started in the past and continued <u>up until another time in the past</u>. In this case we use expressions of duration such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• for an hour</li> <li>• for three years</li> </ul>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I <b>had been living</b> in that small town for three years before <u>I moved to New York</u>.</li> </ul>
<p>We use the <b>Past Perfect Continuous</b> before another action in the past to show cause and effect.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• I <u>was so tired</u>. I <b>had been revising my lessons</b> for hours.</li> </ul>
